

Primary Sports Premium Funding 2022-2023

At Castle Cary Primary School our mission is to create and inspire happy, successful, confident and responsible learners who strive to be the best they can be. We aim to be "a school where learning is an adventure."

Our vision is:

- 1. A whole school ethos where everyone feels safe, respected, valued, included, happy and healthy
 - 2. An inspirational and aspirational curriculum underpinned by our core learning values
 - 3. To have effective and efficient leaders who have outstanding knowledge of the school
 - 4. A school where achievement in all areas is celebrated

Primary Sport Premium: This financial year the school has received £17,815 to support and develop the delivery of high quality PE in school.

How we use the money effectively: A specialist sports coach offers a range of after school clubs and we try to identify sports that children may not have tried before during the year. In addition to this, we have recently trained our own Forest School leader in order to develop outdoor learning across the whole school. Our own PE leader monitors the provision of PE across the school and ensures appropriate CPD is in place for staff. We continue to develop our teaching assistants by training them working alongside our specialist coach. We also use the funding to encourage children to participate in tournaments and inter school competitions. We are also encouraging greater activity at break times with new equipment for the children to use.

The 5 key indicators that schools should expect to see improvement across:

- 1. The engagement of all children in regular physical activity the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school
- 2. The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement
- 3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- 4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all children
- 5. Increased participation in competitive sport
